

Introduction for the Feast of Baptism of the Lord

Today, as we transition from the joyous celebration of Christmas into Ordinary Time, we are invited to reflect on the profound mystery of God's revelation. The readings for today – Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11; Psalm 104:1b-2, 3-4, 24-25, 27-30; Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-7; and the Gospel of Luke 3:15-16, 21-22 – guide us to contemplate the enduring power of God's word and the ongoing work of salvation in the world.

Isaiah, the prophet, proclaims a message of hope and comfort, announcing that the Lord, like a shepherd, will tenderly guide His people through the wilderness of life. The Psalm echoes this theme, celebrating the majesty and power of God, the Creator of all things, whose love and care extend to every creature in the universe.

The Apostle Paul, in his letter to Titus, exhorts us *to live lives of holiness and self-control*, reflecting the grace of God in all our actions. This call to holiness is a constant reminder of our baptismal covenant and our ongoing journey of discipleship.

Finally, in the Gospel, we witness the pivotal moment of Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River. As Jesus emerges from the water, the heavens open, and the voice of the Father proclaims, "*You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.*" This is a moment of profound revelation, a moment when the Trinity is fully revealed.

Let us strive to live out the grace of our Baptism, reflecting the light of Christ in all our words and actions.
