## Reflection on the Readings

**Deuteronomy 6:2-6** presents the Shema, a central tenet of Jewish faith: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and strength." This commandment emphasizes total devotion, calling us to love God with every aspect of our being. St. Augustine reflects on this, stating that true love for God must be at the heart of our actions, as it is only through this love that we can fulfill the commandments effectively.

**Psalms 18:2-4, 47, 51** echoes the themes of divine protection and strength. The psalmist proclaims, "The Lord is my rock, my fortress, and my deliverer." The Fathers of the Church, particularly St. John Chrysostom, emphasize that recognizing God as our refuge empowers us to follow His commandments with confidence. In **Mark 12:28-34**, Jesus succinctly sums up the law, urging us to love God and our neighbor. This connection between love and obedience is crucial; as St. Thomas Aquinas notes, love naturally compels us to act in accordance with God's will. Following the commandments is not merely an obligation; it is a response to the love we receive from God.
