"The mid-19th century witnessed a growing interest among Catholics in education, coinciding with a rise in Catholic immigration. To serve their expanding communities, American Catholics opened their own schools, aided by religious orders such as the Sisters of Mercy, who arrived from Ireland in 1843, and the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, organized in 1845 to teach in Michigan. At the university level, Fordham University was founded in New York City in 1841. The University of Notre Dame was founded in 1842 by the Congregation of Holy Cross in Indiana. The Catholic University of America was founded in Washington in 1887. Such successes provoked an intolerant backlash, fueled by groups such as the Know-Nothing Society. Mobs burned a convent and murdered a nun in Massachusetts in 1834, destroyed two churches in New England in 1854, and, that same year, tarred and feathered—and nearly killed—Father John Bapst, a Swiss Jesuit who taught in Maine and ministered to the Passamaquoddy people and Irish immigrants, among others.

The late 19th century witnessed the continued growth of religious orders, such as the founding of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament by wealthy heiress Katharine Drexel to address the educational needs of Black and Native Americans. It also saw the appointment of the first cardinals in the United States: John McCloskey in New York and James Gibbons in Baltimore. In 1904, Catholic educators formed a new organization, the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA). In 1915, the Catholic Hospital Association was formed, later renamed the Catholic Health Association. Its first convention brought together 200 sisters, lay nurses, and physicians. Today, the organization represents more than 600 Catholic hospitals and a network of 1,200 care facilities nationwide. Every day, one in six hospitalized patients receives care at a Catholic healthcare facility.

In 1910, the National Conference of Catholic Charities (NCCC) was founded in ...the campus of The Catholic University of America. The organization played a key role in the development of the National Housing Act, the support for the creation of Social Security, and the founding of the National Catholic School of Social Service. Later, the NCCC would be renamed Catholic Charities USA, a national network of Catholic social service providers with over 170 member agencies that, together, served more than 8.5 million people in need in 2014. In 1917, the bishops of the United States formed the National Catholic War Council (NCWC) to enable American Catholics to support members of the Armed Forces during World War I. In 1919, Pope Benedict XV urged the hierarchy to join him in working for peace and social justice. In response, the bishops organized the National Catholic Welfare Council that same year, headquartered in Washington, with a general secretary and a small staff. In 1922, the National Catholic Welfare Conference (NCWC) was established to address issues such as education, immigration, and social action" (www.usccb.org).

Sharing Faith in the Little Things

In the article written by Mike Aquilina, he explains that faith is often passed on through small, everyday actions rather than long lectures or formal teaching. He remembers how his father would tip his hat whenever they passed a Catholic church as a sign of respect for Jesus in the Eucharist, known in Catholicism as the "Real Presence." Although his father rarely spoke openly about religion, this simple gesture taught the author that faith was important and present in daily life.

The author also reflects on his mother's quiet expressions of faith. She prayed while doing ordinary household tasks, such as dusting or handling rosary beads. These small moments became lasting memories that showed him how deeply faith could be woven into normal family routines. Through these examples, Aquilina shows that children often learn spiritual values by observing the habits and attitudes of their parents.

Throughout the article, Aquilina emphasizes that ordinary actions—going to Mass, kneeling in prayer, making the sign of reverence, or speaking respectfully about God—can have a powerful influence on children. He connects this idea to the teachings of the Second Vatican Council, which taught that holiness and spirituality are lived out through family life and everyday circumstances.

The overall message of the article is that even the smallest faith-filled actions can leave a deep and lasting impact. Parents may not realize it, but their quiet examples of devotion, prayer, and reverence can shape their children's beliefs and values for the rest of their lives.
